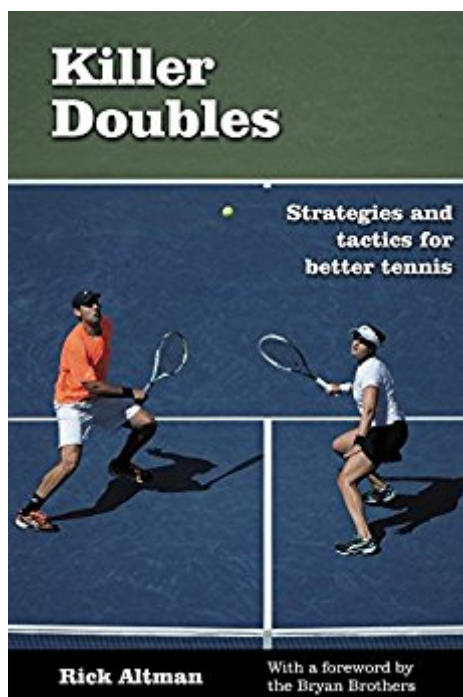

If you are a student of the game or just tired of losing this book is a must read. I'm currently a 3.0 borderline 3.5 player that seems to lose a large number of close matches.(5-7,6-4) I've got a descent 1st and 2nd serve with all the other shots. A few days ago I bought "killer Doubles" and could not put it down. The very next day I played a match using some of the strategy and techniques Rick gives. On the way to the match, I summarized Ricks words to my partner. We tried to do everything I could recall from the previous nights reading. After going up 4-0 we lost a little momentum, then it was 4-4. After talking things over we went back to Rick's methods and won the

match 7-5,6-3. Wow, Rick makes everyday common sense tennis seem so easy to understand and utilize. I've read a dozen books, watched countless videos and nothing has helped me as much as the first ten chapters of this book. If your tired of losing or just want to play better tennis and move up a level, this is a must read book! Oh, as a team captain I have ordered several copies in paperback for some of my other players.

I have been a professional tennis coach and instructor for over 25 years. I have also played tournaments and team tennis at the 4.5 level for at least that long.
